### **2. Deterrence**


**Severity and pattern of** behaviour should be key factors for determining sanctions


## **3. Prevention**


**Recent security upgrades** by NUS address the biggest areas of concern regarding safety felt safer with recent need




## 4. Education

**Education on respect** and consent is critical

#### Frequency

On average, students said that the education module on respect and consent should be repeated once

#### every 1 to 1.5 years



### Ongoing commitment



NUS should review the **disciplinary framework** and victim support system once every two years 0/0

NUS should conduct an annual survey to understand students' concerns

Methodology: NUS commissioned an independent research consultancy to conduct an online survey of the entire NUS student body in May 2019 to gather views on the University's disciplinary framework, support system for victims, and approach to safety on campus. More than 5,200 students responded.
